



Ramblings from the Reverend

Dear friends,

For the last year or so, the Session (our board of elders) have been having preliminary conversations about how welcoming and including we are of folks who identify as LGBTQ+. We know that we have these folks in our congregation, and we love and appreciate them, but how fully they are included in the life of the church is worthy of our prayerful wisdom and discernment. On November 26 I preached a message where I addressed my own (changed) viewpoint on the issue, offered some scriptural support for my view, and spoke to Session's role in this.

At issue is the difference in wording between the current PC(USA) Book of Order (our denomination's "constitution") and what we as FPC currently abide by- which includes an addendum from the previous Book of Order.

The current language of the Book of Order, regarding ordination standards states: "(T)hose who undertake particular ministries (deacon, elder, minister) should be persons of strong faith, dedicated discipleship, and love of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel in the church and in the world." This wording allows individual churches the choice of ordaining practicing LGBTQ+ folks.

Twelve years ago, the Session at FPC chose to maintain some of the wording regarding officer (deacons, elders, ministers) ordination standards with language of the old Book of Order: "officers of the church must maintain chastity outside of marriage and fidelity within marriage, as defined as between a man and a woman." To be clear, we at FPC also abide by all that is in the current Book of Order's statement, but include the previous Book of Order's requirements as an additional requirement.

The Session, in order to find common language to talk about this issue – before taking on the potential implications for us as a church - read two books: What Does It Mean To Be Welcoming by Travis Collins, and Changing Our Mind by David Gushee. Though Collins takes a traditional view regarding LGBTQ+ in church leadership roles, and Gushee argues for full inclusion, both authors write with winsome and pastoral hearts, and both openly engage the pertinent scriptures.

It is important for the church to understand that the Session is responsible for any decisions regarding our individual church ordination standards. But certainly, it is well and right for the church as a whole to engage in Christ-like conversation about this. We want to invite any and all interested active church participants to two Thursday night meetings to engage in this conversation: Thursday, February 8, and Thursday, February 22nd. We are asking that all participants, if possible, be there for both nights.

We are offering these gatherings in February in order to give all of those participating in the discussion time to read both the Collins and the Gushee books that the Session has read. Reading the two books is a requirement to take part in the Thursday night discussions. We are requiring

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
the reading so that the conversations have a shared background of understanding. Elders will be on hand to facilitate and take notes of the conversations. Elders will share with each other what was said at their subsequent Session meetings.

If you would like to participate in these Thursday meetings, please either sign up, using the QR code below or on Sunday morning at the Connect Center. We will be happy to order the books for you (and happy, if you are able, to have you pay for them), or you may purchase the books on your own (but please still sign up).

Having this conversation in ways that honor Jesus and each other is good and right – and something I believe we are prepared to do. I hope you will join us.

A handful of years ago, the high school group's Westport team was beginning to feel so large the student leaders weren't connecting as intimately as prior years. One of our volunteers had the simple idea to carve out 30 minutes after dinner each night to allow for "connections." Students who didn't know each other well would simply pair up, armed with dessert and provided prompts, and spend half an hour together. Truthfully, we expected the conversations to be forced and ultimately awkward.



We were wrong!

We quickly learned 30 minutes weren't enough for their time together, so we then gave them 45 minutes- which wasn't enough! Eventually, we had to force people to come back after an hour so we could continue with all we had planned for the night. This trend continued every day after, and has become a beloved tradition over the past 4-5 years.

Not only is *intergenerational community* a value at FPC, it is also becoming widely known that intergenerational friendships are a huge blessing to all involved. Recent articles in both Christianity Today and The Atlantic have highlighted the importance, and benefits, of friendship between generations.

We hope you'll join us on January January 21, 28 & February 4 during Act II as we experiment with **Connections** as we pair you up with 1-2 other folks from FPC who are of a different generation than you. We'll supply you with coffee, tea, snacks and 4-5 conversation prompts you can pick and choose from. Our prayer is that these conversations and connections will help us live more fully into our value of believing "every generation has a gift to give one another."

A Reflection on Empathy

FPC's Stephen Ministers have been studying together a book titled "The Gift of Empathy" since October.

The authors' research affirms our instinct, that expressing empathy can build surprising bonds between people, even in a momentary encounter between strangers. Especially when someone is hurting, empathy is the most caring and helpful approach we can take. An empathetic person 1) enters the other's world and experiences their feelings with them, and 2) expresses that empathy through a gentle response–all without getting "stuck in the mud" of the other's pain.



When someone expresses empathy towards me, I feel understood, valued, believed, encouraged, accepted, cared for, not alone. What an extraordinary outcome! Practicing empathy on a regular basis with those around us can lead to deeper relationships, expanded perspective, personal growth, more confidence in social interactions, less pressure to "fix" things, and great joy as we make a difference in others' lives. What extraordinary outcomes!

Among many other wonderful topics, the book addresses "obstacles to empathy" within us. Even as people who believe in the loving care of God and the victory of Jesus over sin and death, we can

struggle to maintain an empathetic stance towards others-especially those closest to us. Which is your biggest obstacle to empathizing with someone in pain?

- desiring to fix the situation (which either doesn't help or isn't what the other truly wants)
- wanting to change the other person's feelings ("cheer up! Stop feeling so sad!")
- making evaluations about the situation and comparisons to others' similar experiences ("my brother had it way worse than you")

- internal feelings of judgment or blame, expressed outwardly ("you chose your own path")
- disagreements about other things ("I don't like your politics, so I can't empathize with your pain")
- differences in age, gender, culture, values, life experiences, etc.
- fear of emotional fatigue or burnout
- urge to share my own story (thus taking the spotlight off the other)

A prayer for those who wish to grow in empathy:

Loving God, show me who is hurting today. Help me set aside my assumptions and judgment so I can enter their world as you do. Give me your grace to honor their story, stay with them in their pain, and express your gentle love in a way they can hear. So may I shine brightly for you in this dark world. Amen.

Update on Intergenerational Tijuana Trip

Date: July 3 - July 9 (could also be July 4 - July 10) **Cost:** One can choose one of these options per person:

- \$700 out of pocket, participate in the auction, bake sale, support letter fundraisers. *FPC purchases your plane ticket with the group*.
- Pay \$300 out of pocket, participate in the auction, bake sale, support letter fundraisers. *You take care of your own plane ticket*
- Pay \$1.700 out of pocket. No fund raising. FPC purchases your plane ticket with the group.
- Pay \$1,300 out of pocket. No fund raising. You take care of your own plane ticket.

Purpose: Build 1-2 homes (depending on how many folks join) for a family in need. Would also spend time with the orphanage Unidos Por Siempre helping out with projects as needed. Time Commitment: Fundraiser participation (if chosen), at least 2 team prep meetings (likely In April and June) to help plan, prep, and serve together before heading down to TJ.

One Parish One Prisoner

A couple months back we introduced the exciting opportunity for FPC to join with One Parish One Prisoner as a new expression of hospitality. OPOP is a re-entry model that matches churches with an incarcerated person for their mutual transformation. A relationship of trust is built through letter writing and prison visits. And when the time comes, this person will find the embrace of an entire parish community who already knows them and can assist with the many obstacles to re-entry.

After receiving a great amount of interest from folks in our church, due to varying circumstances we are still 1-2 people short of being able to move forward with a team.

We still believe in this call and we know there are incarcerated folks waiting to be matched with a group of folks who are willing to know and support them.
