Ramblings from the Reverend

First Pres folks,

The word "Wilderness" is used 266 times in the bible. Almost every major Old Testament character spends time in the wilderness. It is in the wilderness that Abraham is tested, where Hagar nearly dies and is rescued, it is where Jacob wrestles, where David is shaped. It is in the wilderness that the freed Hebrew nation bumbles and stumbles and wanders and exasperates their liberator, Moses. It is during that forty-year unwanted pilgrimage that God shows up for his people and disciples them. It is there that God feeds his people daily, he sustains them and keeps them from death.

The liberation from Egypt, followed by the forty-years in the wilderness becomes the seminal story of the Jewish people. The Psalmist say in Psalm 78:

> In the sight of their ancestors God worked marvels in the land of Egypt, in the fields of Zoan. He divided the sea and let them pass through it and made the waters stand like a heap. In the daytime he led them with a cloud and all night long with a fiery light. He split rocks open in the wilderness and gave them drink abundantly as from the deep. He made streams come out of the rock and caused waters to flow down like rivers.

The power of God, the ongoing deliverance of God in the wilderness is the great story of Israel. For the Christian, that power and that deliverance out of the wilderness is read into the cosmos-altering ministry of Jesus. We live in the wilderness, who will save us while we are there and who will lead us out? As Christians, we believe that Jesus joins us in the wilderness, and through his cross, leads us to the Promised Land.

Indeed, the New Testament picks up on the reality and importance of the wilderness. The gospels begin with John the Baptist defining and being defined by his presence in the wilderness. Intentionally, people flock into the wilderness to hear from John and to receive God's gift of repenting baptism through John. John is a creature of the wilderness, someone whose life has been crafted by the spareness of the desert, someone who has honed his experience of God by living in dependence on God in an otherwise bleak environment.

Jesus, of course, goes out to meet his cousin John in that wilderness, in order, Jesus insists, to undergo those same waters of baptism that those seeking repentance have undergone. Rising out of those waters, the voice from the heavens affirms Jesus as the beloved Son... but then the Holy Spirit "casts Jesus out into the wilderness in order to be tempted." Jesus spends forty days in that wilderness, fasting, praying, learning the fullness of what it will mean to fulfill his role in being our Lord and Savior.


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In almost all the accounts of wilderness in scripture it is referring to a literal place. But the spiritual lessons learned in the wilderness are greater than the actual geographical reality. Let me offer what I intend to be a spiritual definition of wilderness: "It is that place and that time, where comforts are stripped away, and one must contend with God, and one's dependence on God. For most of us the

wilderness (literal and metaphorical) is not a place we would choose to go – but the truth is it is there where so many of us have experienced our greatest spiritual growth and matured more deeply in our faith in Christ."

This year, for the season of Lent, let's use these wilderness stories to ask God how he might be shaping us in our own time in the wilderness. Let's make ourselves vulnerable enough to enter into that place where everything else is stripped away and we rely on God... and God is sure to meet us!


Here are some other options to participate as well:

Caring for One Another: prayer partners, meals ministry, and more

We asked some of our Deacons about their participation in the after-worship prayer ministry as prayer partners. Here's what they said...

Why did you want to be part of the prayer ministry?

Steve Baird: "Praying is mutually building up each other. We are reinforcing the work of the Holy Spirit in us. It is humbling when someone asks you to pray for them."

Sidoney Barth: "This deep and abiding love of God through prayer has been a blessing to me personally over the years as I learned to turn to prayer in times of heartbreak. Prayer was a lifeline for me in the past. I humbly ask the Lord to help me share that learned light with others as part of the prayer ministry at First Pres."

Cynthia Geraghty: "James 5:16 says, 'Confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed.' For many years, I knew God had forgiven me for mistakes I'd made, but I continued to not forgive myself and felt guilt for letting God down. It was when I openly admitted to fellow believers my weakness and asked for prayer that my healing finally began. I want to be part of a ministry that helps people be healed, and don't all of us need healing!"

Isn't it hard to be a prayer partner?

Steve Baird: "No! I just need to get my head clear of distractions. When someone comes and asks for prayer, God helps me focus and the Holy Spirit guides me in how to pray for them."

Cynthia Geraghty: "I used to be afraid to pray for others because I wouldn't know what to say. Now I know the Holy Spirit gives me the words. I sometimes just restate what the person said and ask God to hear their plea. It's also rewarding. One person has come to me twice to say thank you for praying with her mother. She said it really meant a lot to both of them."

Updates From FPC Funded Mission Partners:

Thrive International

In 2023, FPC's Mission Team approved a funding request from Thrive International to donate money to a "Cultural Integration Program" for their Ukranian Refugees. As you can see below, the program has been a great success!



Happy and blessed New Year!

During the 2023 period I was able to provide Cultural Integration trips, events and activities that include, but are not limited to concerts, sport tournaments, hikes, bike rides, lake days, Seattle trip tour, Leavenworth, Grand Coulee visit and much more. Throughout these events I was able to serve recent refugees from the Ukraine.

During the year we had a total of 38 events prepared and around 1,255 people attended these organized programs and events that were offered.



For comparison in 2022 we had around 700 people attending our events and activities, and we had only 17 events. In addition, approximately 2,800 miles were driven in the Great Pacific NW while exploring our region with our residents.

In 2023 Cultural Integration Program was able to almost double the number of people participating in our activities as well as increase the number of activities offered. It was a productive year of serving needy refugees and observing how they are moving from surviving to thriving.

Thank you management for supporting the Cultural Integration Program. Looking forward to 2024 adventures in serving our refugee community.

Doxa's education program provides scholarships and resources to children in Tijuana. Education empowers youth to break the cycle and mindset of poverty. As Doxa has expanded its education program to East Tijuana, we used the blue print from our 10+ years of experience in West Tijuana.

First, relationally equipping students to succeed by surrounding them with competent tutors and coaching their parents to be a positive voice when it comes to education. Second, materially equipping students to succeed by simply providing school supplies, uniforms, tuition, and other necessities.

A few years after starting an education program, Doxa realized that an after-school program was needed. Recognizing that most schools in Mexico are only half-day and almost all parents work a full day; the after-school program fills the niche of the other half. In 2019, Doxa helped build a classroom addition onto Unidos por Siempre, which serves as the education home base for East Tijuana.

> Earlier this year, Maria and Angeles noticed another need: food insecurity. Erika, whose children are scholarship recipients and live in East Tijuana, shared that for many families "sometimes there is enough to eat and sometimes not. There isn't always something constant, that you can depend on."

We brainstormed solutions. It quickly became clear that a soup kitchen operated at Unidos por Siempre was the best answer. All the tools we needed were lying right in front of us: using the existing kitchen facilities, Panchita as the cook, and Angeles to help organize. A nutritious and healthy lunch is prepared every day.


Panchita's menu is diverse and well-balanced: tacos, enchiladas, beans, rice, fruits, soups, sandwiches, and vegetables. Panchita says that "my heart is filled when stomachs are filled and people eat my food with pleasure.

First Pres Christian School


