In Paul's magnificent passage of love, I Corinthians 13, his audience is not wedding couples, but rather the church. I Corinthians 13 is just one part of a multiple chapter discourse in which Paul is correcting and encouraging the church in Corinth. At the heart of what Paul is putting forth is the admonition for the church to act in loving community – to take the love that they have received from Christ (a sacrificial love that culminates on the cross and is validated by the empty tomb) and to live out that love with other Christians in the church.

The consistent message of the New Testament is that the church is a community. That the church exists for the mutual encouragement and nurture of one another. The church is to be marked by the kind of communal love that is "patient, and kind, not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude." It is a love that "does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. (The love of the church) never ends."

What a gift from God that we can belong to a community that places this love as our communal value, the goal to which we aspire. What a challenge it is for all of us individually to participate in the sacrificial love of caring for each other here in the church. The church is the Body of Christ which exists to be in fruitful community with each other.

The church as a community is only one half of what Christ equips the church to be. The church is also called to be an active witness to the inbreaking kingdom of Jesus. Caring for each other is only one of the marks of the true church. Jesus is clear in his calling to the church. In Acts 1 the post-resurrected/pre-ascended Jesus says to his followers, "...You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

To witness to Jesus is to witness to his kingdom. It is to live out lives of sacrificial service, to place the needs of others before our own (because we know that Jesus has already met our deepest needs). It is to be the salt and light that Jesus tells us to be – to flavor the world around us and to shine the light of Christ into the darkness.

There is no competition between these two goals of the church. We are called to be both – a Christcentered community and a witness to others of the kingdom of Christ.

I'm pleased that we can be both here at First Pres, and I'm personally delighted to be able to do this with all of you!

An excerpt from A Vision for the Aging Church: Renewing Ministry for and by Seniors by James M. Houston & Michael Parker, pp.122-125.

"As we review God's admonitions about how to age successfully, we must remind ourselves that the grace by which we were saved is the same grace by which we live... Though I believe each of us receives a unique call from God, the mission statement for all seniors can be found in Psalm 71:

For you have been my hope, O Sovereign Lord, my confidence since my youth. From birth I have relied on you... Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, O God, till

I declare your power to the next generation, your might to all who are to come. –Psalm 71:5-6, 18



"When one thinks of elders, one should not think of frail, dependent people. On the contrary, the hope of our nation and perhaps of the world rests on the shoulders of those who comprise the aging church. The most frail and physically dependent person may also be the most ardent prayer warrior or the most wise or courageous member of a congregation. Legions of seniors in churches nationwide can led the way to a spiritual transformation of America and even the world.

"Elders can leave us a multitude of legacies, including how to live sacrificially, how to appreciate traditions that teach us to value history, how to treasure the moment, how to confront our materialistic tendencies, how to value life from the womb to the grave, how to maintain a robust health and intellect for as long as possible, how to live successfully with and learn from chaos and difficulty, how to live courageously, how to persevere, how to express faith in love, how to genuinely worship, how to live on a budget, how to forgive, how to live in unity with other Christians, how to share one's faith, and how to glorify and enjoy Christ now and forever."



My community of friends are not often church-based, or even Christian, having run up too many times against some aspect of its bigotry or rejection. But it is a community where everyone is welcomed, and there is a feeling of safety and support in being both yourself, and who you want to become. I want to share that feeling with our incarcerated friend, who is being reborn with barely clothes and pocket change, and few connections, into a changed world.

Our incarcerated friend didn't get to pick us, as no newborn chooses to whom it is born. What makes the difference is that, this time, we are choosing them. We hear the language of brother and sister all the time in our liturgy, however, as an only child I don't really understand what it means to be a sibling. But I can still be family

As a hospital chaplain in Orlando, FL, I occasionally was called on to visit the county or city jail as part of the process of requesting a temporary furlough for a prisoner to visit a dying family member in the hospital. Being even that briefly exposed to the prison environment helped me to realize the pain and suffering many of the prisoners were experiencing. Also, it increased my awareness of, "There but for the Grace of God go I!" OPOP gives me an opportunity to possibly alleviate some of the pain I witnessed and, hopefully, contribute to breaking the toxic cycle in one person's life.

Why did I join the OPOP team?? I attended the introductory meeting to learn about the program and just knew I wanted to participate. And thus far I have been very impressed with the process. We are getting to know Thomas and he's learning about us as we communicate thru letters. We are also learning ways we can be helpful as he transitions from prison to life after his release. I look forward to seeing how God uses us to bless Thomas as our relationship with Thomas blesses us.
