

Ramblings from the Reverend

Greetings FPC family,

When I was asked to write this newsletter article, my first thought was, there's not too much to say! Writing in mid-July, there is just not much happening in the church's activity calendar these days. We are not yet ready to report on the summer, not ready to begin announcing the fall's activities.

We're somewhere in the middle of a series of guest preachers, somewhere in the middle of John's sabbatical leave. Staffing transitions are ongoing. We've had some "findings" from our consultancy process, but the bulk of the real work is still in front of us, to be picked up again when John returns and the program year gets going. And the conversations that occurred this past spring on sexuality and gender were only preliminary—with nothing yet resolved or concluded, not even a full presentation of the concerns. So what can be said about any of it?

It's surprised me, then, to discover that it's precisely the "in-between" season that deserves our attention. Because I've also heard many stories of you, beloved church, living through "in-between" times in your own lives recently. In the summer, parents are glad last year is over, hopeful for what next year will bring, but figuring out how in the meantime to fill these empty weeks with kids. Recent graduates and newly marrieds have to figure out what comes next. Some of you have lost jobs unexpectedly, others have retired or taken new positions-but have not yet started. How long before we can get into a new routine of predictability? Others have been thrust into seasons of illness or caring for loved ones in decline, grieving the losses-not by choice, thrust into a wilderness with no clear signs, where you don't know the way out. When will this end? How will we survive? Will we even make it through the "in-between" into some promised land?

And our favorite question of all: What should we do about it? Is there any way to hasten through these liminal times? Shouldn't we just take some action, sooner than later? Make decisions, call it, hurry to the next thing, accomplish some small change so we can move on?

Sometimes we can, but often we can't. We have to wait-for the seasons to turn, for opportunities to be brought to us by the Lord's hand, for things to resolve, for the time to be ripe. The Acts of the Apostles (our summer sermon text) begins with the disciples asking Jesus, "Is this the time when you will restore the kingdom?" They're ready, finally, for the Messiah to declare victory over Jerusalem, for the real action to begin. But Jesus replies, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority." In other words—nope! Not yet! The disciples must continue living in the in-between time, waiting for Jesus to come again, without knowing when it will happen.

And how do Christians wait? The same way that the church has been waiting for the Lord's return for nearly two millennia, since Acts 1:11. With the disciplines of the community that keep us available to the Holy Spirit's work (growing discipleship through prayer & scripture, worship, witness, service and fellowship). With the practices that to an undiscerning outsider may look like "rearranging the chairs on the deck of the Titanic" but to the faithful, are the very reality of our abiding in Jesus (John 15:4). And if you've been following our series of sermons on Acts, you know how amazing such action can be, even in the interim!




Celebrating Staff Anniversaries

Being with my amazing family!



FPC Financial Update

- Pledged income for the sixth month of the year is \$7,565 favorable to budget. Non-Pledged income is \$69,480 favorable to budget.
- The expenses for the sixth month of the year are \$20,306 favorable to budget.
- Church Operations was \$121,716 favorable to a budget of -\$154,464 showing an income of -\$32,747. Note to financial statements: I have moved all transactions (income and expense) related to Long Term Investments with Presbytery Foundation and 3rd and Cedar to a new section of the income statement called Other Income and Expenses. This section sits below the Church Operations. There will still be a Net Income/Loss line that takes Church Operations and Other Income and Expenses into account. The Mark to Market Value Recognition will still sit below the Net Income/Loss line. In the 2024 budget process

all sections of the income statement will be budgeted except the Mark to Market Value Recognition.

First Presbyterian Christian School



First Presbyterian Christian School is planning for new STEM programming for the 2023–2024 school year! With the help of Sarah Hauge's grant writing skills, we were awarded two STEM grants (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math). STCU granted us \$10,000 through their new Here for Good Foundation and Avista awarded us \$5,000. These two grants together will allow us the funding to:

- Create an amazing STEM Room in the school, complete with a Maker Space, new STEM materials, books, and equipment.
- Pay teachers/people to teach after school preschool STEM electives (12:45 1:30 p.m.) and after school K-3rd Grade STEM electives (3:15 4:15 p.m.). We will be looking for some people who have skills in science, technology, engineering, and math to be guest teachers for these classes.
- Allow FPCS students, as well as other children in our community, to attend these classes for free. We will be inviting friends from FPC Family Ministries, Thrive International, Feast World Kitchen, and Barton School.
- Fully fund two Family STEM Nights this year, open to school families, church families, and families in our community.

We are grateful for this opportunity to expand our school offerings and our connection with the church and community. More information to come in September! 
